## The Pentathlon by Tara, age 12

My name is Tara. I 'm in the 5th. Grade at Four Winds Waldorf School, in Warrenville Illinois. We are taught in a way that makes learning fun. We stay with our teacher from first to eighth grade, and we have many specialty teachers for German, Spanish, handwork, etc. We just finished our Greek learning block. We learned about Greek myths and history and that is where my story begins.

In most Waldorf schools the fifth grade class goes to the Pentathlon in spring, after training throughout the school year. The Pentathlon is a five-event Greek Olympics. This year, 158 fifth graders, from many states, came together for this event in Viroqua Wisconsin

All the schools had campsites next to one another. We explored the forest nearby and saw a huge beaver dam. We spent time getting to know our competitors.

The games started with an Opening Ceremony and the Olympic Torch was lit. A lady dressed as Athena cried out, "Let the games begin"!

There were six groups that were named after the city-states of Greece. I was a member of the Athens group.

The events included: the 220 run, the 40 yard dash, the discus, the javelin, the long jump and the Greek wrestling. In each event you are judged by beauty, (form) and truth, (the competitive winner). Beauty and truth were equally important, just as they were in the original Olympics.

The winners of the first rounds make it to the semi-finals. There were 36 semi-finalists for each event.

Getting into the finals was an even greater honor. There were 6 finalists for each event. I made the finals for the long jump, the 40 yard dash, the 220 run, and wrestling.

Only first place winners earn laurels (leaf crowns) and this is the highest honor. I didn't win a laurel, but I did my best. Two years ago, Ann, from Roselle won the laurels in wrestling, for truth and beauty.

A Greek feast and Closing Ceremony were held, and the Olympic Torch was extinguished. I had tons of fun and I can't wait till my sister Heather, goes in two years...
